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# **Convention Department**

#### **Convention Department Update**

PCR's annual convention is a crown jewel of the Region, well-known for excellent clinics, fun operating sessions and great layout tours. But it's often said that nothing is constant except change—and the needs and interests of our members, plus the cost structure of traditional hotel-convention centers, are changing. Recognizing this, in April 2018 President Merrin appointed a special committee on the future of conventions chaired by

Frank Markovich and assisted by Chris Palermo. When I became the convention department manager, I joined the team.

We've reviewed issues such as length, structure, location, cost and content based on both seasoned perspectives and new ones. PCR members who have provided an e-mail address to the Region—over 900 of you—received an invitation in August to respond to a brief online survey. Over 125 of you responded, which is fantastic—thank you. We're carefully considering your input, and while we won't be able to implement every specific suggestion, the broad themes represented in the responses have been insightful and will be passed on to the Board of Directors. For example, it's clear that a strong clinics program is the cornerstone of every convention; layout tours and socializing opportunities also ranked quite high. We do apologize for one oversight—the survey did not include questions about interest in operating sessions, but your free-form comments told us, loud and clear, that you love them!

Our review is nearly complete and will be presented to the Board of Directors at its midyear meeting in October. While all the specific recommendations are not ready as of the deadline for this issue of Branch Line, we're confident that our report will lead to better, well-attended, cost-effective conventions and helpful guidance for Division host committees.

In the coming months, I'll be continuing to lead selected revisions to the Region's Convention Handbook to reflect some of these recommendations. Some of you have already been asked to rewrite sections, but we'll defer that work until the Board reviews the special committee's recommendations. We're not recommending changes in PCR's bylaws, which define basic elements of a convention. Our overall approach is advisory, to preserve the flexibility of different Division host committees to choose different paths if they're better for the local environment or market conditions in that particular year.

In the meantime, please join me in thinking about how you can contribute to our next great convention at McClellan in 2019, by presenting a clinic, entering the model contest, volunteering in some other way or just attending and adding to the fun. Thanks for your support.

Have you all noticed that registration is now open for Diamonds are Forever, the 2019 PCR/Feather River Rail Society Convention scheduled for May 2-5 in Sacramento? Shirts and convention cars are available as well. So get to it and register! It's pretty easy to visit their website and register there (http://pcrnmra.org/conv2019/).

There had been rumors and innuendos that there wasn't going to be a convention next year, and yes, it's been late getting off the ground. We won't belabor the reasons for that again here, but so what? It's going to happen and like all PCR conventions the members attending will have a great time.

It's also going to be the opportunity to experience what might be the new look for our get-togethers. Rather than running from Wednesday afternoon through Sunday morning, activities will start on Thursday morning. For example, the PCR Board of Directors will convene Thursday morning rather than Wednesday after lunch. The meeting will also be split between a dedicated conference facility and a nearby hotel, rather than taking place at one self-contained location. Apart from all this, the content will have all the familiar elements – clinics, prototype and layout tours, SIGs, contests, Awards Banquet (with Charlie Getz as the keynote speaker), Sunday breakfast meeting, and so on. Hope you can make it.

Meanwhile, planning for the 2020 convention is already beginning.

On a different front, I'd like to announce the recipient of a brand new, hot off the griddle NMRA award. The name of the award is "The NMRA President's Award for Service to the Division." All of us Regional President's were asked to nominate one of our members for this award, which is meant to recognize those who have labored at the grass roots level, e.g., Divisional, to keep NMRA afloat. Note that this is different from the PCR's President's Award, which recognizes service to the Region and is bestowed upon worthy members by the PCR President. This award comes from the NMRA President and is given to one member from each Region.

After soliciting recommendations form all PCR Directors I nominated Gus Campagna from the Redwood Empire Division for this honor. Gus received his plaque from Scott Lockhart, RED Superintendent, in a brief ceremony at the site of his railroad, the California Western, on August 29th.

Many of you know Gus, but for those who don't or are not familiar with his contributions, here is the brief synopsis of his RED/PCR/NMRA career that accompanied my nominating letter:

"Gus Campagna has been member of the Redwood Empire Division since 1982. Gus's work and influence over the years have literally kept the Division afloat. He has held a number of elected positions, including Chief Clerk (1989 - 1993), Superintendent (1993 - 1995), and PCR Director representing RED (1999 - 2002, 2007). He has served as RED Membership Chair on a continuous basis since 2003 and continues to serve as the original and only RED Webmaster (he has also performed this function for the PCR's Sierra Division and for the Northwestern Pacific Historical Society, whose Board he serves on as well). He is one of the "old hands" on every convention committee the RED has put together for the PCR.

He was the convention chair for the PCR convention in 1999. He edited the RED Callboard, for six years. He has been the audiovisual expert for the PCR and RED meets as well as PCR conventions. On the Regional level, he has directed the PCR Publication Department since 2001, even briefly stepping in as the editor of its Branch Line. To top it off, he and his wife Mary (also a an active PCR member) has long provided lunches for sale at RED quarterly meets, extending this service to Coast Division meets as well. In short, it's hard to come up with things that Gus hasn't done for the RED."

One of the difficulties I had in providing this nomination for the NMRA President's Award for Service to the Division was selecting just one person. There are so many of you out there that are worthy of this kind of recognition, but only one of you can get this each year. I'm hopeful that the prospect of being singled out this way can give more deserving folks a good reason to carry on. The real winners will be all of us.



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#### Achievement Program - Association Volunteer

We all enjoy this hobby even more because of the numerous volunteers who work on our behalf at the National level, produce our regional conventions, open their layouts to convention attendees, and help out at our divisional meets. All of these people can be referred to as "Association Volunteers" which is a category under the Achievement Program. Like the other certificates, the full requirements for this category are available on the Internet at the NMRA site, www.nmra.org. This is a category for the Master Model Railroader program which might

encourage you to volunteer at one of these many opportunities. For those who have already volunteered, submit your paperwork!

The intent of the requirements for Association Volunteer is to reward those modelers who volunteer at the National, Regional, or Divisional level of the NMRA. A total of 60 time units (TUs) are required to satisfy this requirement. There are a number of ways to accrue these credits. For example:

Active satisfactory service as a National committee member or Chairman of a Regional committee receives 2 TUs per month.

Active satisfactory service on a Regional committee or Divisional Chairman is good for 1 TU per month.

Service as a Divisional officer or director is worth 1 TU per month.

Active satisfactory service as a Division committee or board member equals  $\frac{1}{2}$  TU per month.

While these TUs are typical for those given for elected or appointed officials, there are other TUs which are available for volunteer efforts:

Judges at NMRA-sponsored model contests are given 3 TUs per event for judging National contests, 2 TUs for Regional contests, and 1 TU for Divisional contests.

Modelers who open their layouts for tours are also eligible for credit at the rate of 3 TUs per day for National, Regional, and Divisional events (with a maximum of 12 TUs for a National convention, 6 TUs for Regional events, and 3 TUs for Divisional events).

Individuals who participate in modular layout displays at National, Regional, and Divisional meets are also eligible for 3 TUs per day, with the same maximums as for layout tours.

Note that there is generally a maximum of 48 TUs of credit for any one National, convention, 24 TUs for any one Regional convention, and 6 TUs for any one Divisional convention.

There are a number of committees at the Regional level. So what exactly constitutes a "committee"? Basically just about any office or function that isn't covered under Association Official. Most other officers in a Division (or Region) are considered Committee Chairmen. For example, if your Division has a person who

runs the contest at the monthly meeting, they can be considered the "Contest Committee Manager". Your local AP representative is a member of the "Region AP Committee" and so on

Individuals who work just the day of an event (for example, at a Convention registration desk) receive credit for one month's work as a committee member.



The bottom line—keep track of those hours of service to the hobby! The easiest way to do this is to obtain a Record Form (available at www.nmra.org) and have it signed by your local AP Chairman at the time or another official. For open house events, you may also be able to use the official Convention Program as verification of your service to the hobby.

Once you have accumulated a total of 60 certified TUs, complete a Statement of Qualifications and submit it along with a copy of your Membership card.



## What A Long Strange Trip It's Been By Neil Fernbaugh Daylight Division Superintendent & Director

It's been more than a decade since I returned to model railroading.

Several years before I retired, I dug into an old chest to show my grandson my old collection of Lionel 027, Marx, & what now seems to be ancient HO equipment. After that, my five-year plan for a layout began with opening my Dad's old Mare Island storage chest and pulling out those OK Herkimer passenger cars and those gear powered Alcos to show my grandson, Kyle.

After that, my journey towards my own Golden Spike began with visits to PSR and PCR conventions and encouragement from many of the folks you still see on the Daylight and Branch-line mastheads. I started with a 2x2 module for the Visalia Electric club, and some 2x4 switching modules that I thought would quickly be added to my home layout (they weren't).

A couple of my structures won awards or favorable notice from fellow modelers, and I was off on a building spree. After initial encouragement from the Visalia club, I also joined the Golden Empire Historical and Modeling Society in Bakersfield and their members encouraged me to get even more involved.

Doug Wagner welcomed me with open arms, and Dan Seames, let my grandson Kyle run his trains for hours on the layout. A few years later Jason Hill and Doug Willoughby invited me to operate on the famous La Mesa layout in San Diego, and I was hooked on operations.

I began acquiring everything I thought I would need or use. Swap meets, Al's old Bakersfield Hobby Shop, Anita's Central Coast Trains, innumerable visits to eBay, a couple of lucky estate sales.... My cabinets are full. I probably have more cork roadbed, flex track, spikes and tools than I'll ever use. I've actually stopped buying stuff and figure I can finance the next stages of construction by selling stuff off (call me).

I made one extensive but ill-fated attempt to insulate an old equipment storage shed on our ranch for a layout room before my wife and Chief Financial Officer stepped in and insisted on a roofed and air-conditioned room for my layout (that included new storage cabinets and a garage for her new car).

Since then, she has graciously wondered whether I might need room for a desk (for a dispatcher) and a shelf for staging in her side of the garage-- and granted a couple of holes in the wall to make it work.

So, finally, a layout begins to emerge from the chaos. Our contractor managed to put in double doors to the "TRAIN SHED" so I can roll out the old Powermatic table saw onto an outdoor concrete slab from its place under one of the two dog-bones that anchor the southwest and northwest corners of the bench work. Finally, the bench work is in, roadbed is under construction, and a couple of modules will be wired in.

Years of suggestions from the Layout Design SIG (Special Interest Group) and Operations SIG have merged into a somewhat coherent track plan that looks like it's going to work. I have at least five citrus packing sheds, some ag related chemical industries, mid-century sugar beet ops (mostly thanks to Chuck Catania), and by extension, the Monolith Cement Plant and other industries along the east side of the San Joaquin Valley. I designed a central division point yard at what I now call Bikersfield, where ag. products like the oranges my wife and I grow on our small ranch near Ivanhoe can be shipped east and west to the rest of the world.

I really wanted to stick to the kinds of prototype specific details that Jack Burgess' era specific Yosemite Valley rail-road, and other SP and ATSF modelers have done so well, but I've opted for more of what some of our earlier modelers called "good enough." The end result appears to be a railroad that models the East side of the San Joaquin Valley as if the flooding of 1954 ended up with the SP and ATSF using the eastside lines as mainlines. But then, having been so enthralled with the crossing of the Sierra, I'm still trying to incorporate some tourist and timber industries around a mountain resort. We'll see how it works!

At one Southern Pacific Historical Society Convention, I had the opportunity to operate on Dave Houston's Burbank Branch, and that has become the model for my citrus industry branch line. Thanks to a chance to operate with Bruce Morden on Gary Siegel's L&N layout in Santa Barbara, I began to learn much more about using my layout to mimic how real railroads work, and how to turn my layout into more of a chess game or puzzle. That led me to even more interests in how to make my railroad work. More recently, our local leader, Bob Pethoud's, "Fall Creek Branch" switching layout led me to rethink how I will design more of my industrial switching.

As you can see from the photograph, my layout is very much in its beginning stages. Unlike a lot of layouts, it's probably a little less well planned out that the layouts you see in all those Layout Plans from Model Railroader and Tony Koestler. It seems like every riser I add, and every siding I put in, demands some change in benchwork, wiring, or scenery. One of the things I learned from Bill Obermeyer's layout in Atascadero is that you can create a wonderful layout in only a couple of years, so now that I'm started I hope to move along quickly.

Maybe in a year or two I will have something wonderful to show for my efforts, or maybe I will tear out everything and completely change some part of my layout. Mostly, I just want to thank all of you who have helped me on my journey, and urge all of you who are somewhere else along the path to your layout Nirvana to take advantage of all the opportunities your friends, NMRA divisions and regions, special interest groups and more specific historical societies, modular groups, and local clubs that make our hobby such a unique and special way to indulge our few spare moments.





The Answers Are Out There

Backdrop Building

A few years ago, I was offered some property alongside an existing railroad in Fresno County. The offer was contingent on my developing an industrial park for multiple companies wishing regularly to ship and/or receive carload lots from that railroad. The railroad was Marlin Costello's Goshen and Goosechase, now abandoned, but at the time an impressive HO scale model railroad. In this column I'll describe the first structure I erected in that industrial park.

Several miles apart along the old SP (now UP) main line between Fresno and Kingsburg, I found and photographed a couple of old corrugated metal buildings. One was situated on a concrete loading platform and featured faded lettering and richly colored irregular patches of rust; the other was painted a drab color and was unremarkable except for an attractive overhanging roof with exposed rafters and diagonal supports. Of course, I decided to construct a hybrid model having the best features of both buildings.

Selma Raisin—the name I gave this project—was to be a minimal-depth building front extending only a few inches from the backdrop but suggesting a much larger structure. I began with three pieces of 1/8" hardboard screwed to 1x1 corner posts to form the long wall and two short end walls. The end walls are of different lengths because the building and the railroad spur are not parallel to the backdrop. Campbell still makes corrugated aluminum and I decided this would look very authentic for the siding. Still, I used Evergreen corrugated styrene for the roof because it was cheap, available, and easier to use to form the odd trapezoidal shape I needed.

I glued strips of 1/16" thick balsa wood to the outsides of the walls to represent the concrete platform and to mount the siding. By leaving strategically placed gaps between these strips, I created the inset loading doors and pockets for the rafters and diagonal braces. Next, I cut the scale 8-foot long corrugated aluminum into pieces a scale 2½ feet wide and fixed them in place with Walthers Goo. The roof is all styrene, with scale-dimensioned rafters and diagonal braces bonded to the smooth side of the corrugated material.

All of the painting was done with spray cans, mostly Tamiya Color for Plastics. The first coat was a primer, and after it was dry I sprayed a dark gray (Tamiya TS-4) where the lettering was to be. When that was thoroughly cured, I attached ½" and ½" stick-on letters for the company name and the numbers on the doors; then I sprayed all the walls and the roof with a lighter gray (AS-2 or AS-16, I don't remember which). When that was dry to the touch, I removed the stick-on letters to reveal the nicely contrasting sign and door numbers

Finally, the entire building was weathered with Bragdon Enterprises chalks. A stiff-bristled brush works well to apply them, nearly always using vertical strokes (parallel to the corrugations). I say "nearly" because I found I needed to use some strokes perpendicular to the corrugations in order to get the chalks to spread out across the roof.

That's all there was to it: a few enjoyable hours spent photographing, measuring, cutting, gluing, spraying, and brushing and the Goshen and Goosechase had a brand new yet apparently old industry to serve. If you haven't done any scratch building lately (or ever), I recommend a simple background project like this one. #### Doodlebugs, Grandpa, and Me

I have always had a special fondness for Doodlebugs. They are linked to some of the happiest memories of growing up because of my Grandpa. He lived in Versailles, Missouri, which was served by the Rock Island Railroad. Trains 23 and 24 were the daily passenger service between Kansas City and Eldon, Missouri. These trains were not the grand streamlined Rockets. They were Doodlebugs. I probably had my first ride on one of these Doodlebugs when I was only a few months old, but I don't remember those early trips. (I was very young at the time.) Since Dad worked for the Rock Island, we always traveled by train and Mom would get on the Doodlebug in KC and take me to see my grandparents.

Every summer, starting when I was four years old, I got to spend a couple of weeks with Grandpa in Versailles. He taught me how to make a slingshot and shoot it. He LET me help him clean the movie theatre every morning and I got to keep any loose change I found. And always the trips to Versailles started with a trip on the Doodlebug. My first solo trip took place when I couldn't have been more than five. Dad took to me to Union Station and introduced me to the con-

ductor. He was told where I was going, who was to meet me and to keep me on the train until we got there. I do remember those trips well. One of the highlights was the thrill of walking down the aisle to the water cooler, pulling the paper cup from the dispenser and getting a drink. I was probably responsible for the decimation of a small forest as I used up many paper cups each time. The Doodlebug stopped in every small town between KC and Versailles. It dropped off and picked up mail, packages, and people. It was the UPS truck of its time. I remember them unloading cardboard cartons of baby chicks, tomato plants, onion sets, and seed potatoes among other things. I am sure that to grownups the trip seemed long and slow (119 miles with 18 scheduled stops plus several flagstops in 3 hours and 20 minutes), but to a kid on his way to spend time with Grandpa, there were so many things to see at each stop that the time seemed to fly past.

When Bachmann released a doodlebug a few years ago I had to have two of them. One was in the Rock Island livery since this was a part of those childhood memories. The other was undecorated, and the plan was that it would eventually receive some modifications and serve the El Dorado and El Reno Railroad, a freelanced railroad my wife and I are building.

The undecorated version was one of those "get around to it" projects until June of 2004 when Jim Providenza was in St. Louis doing clinics for the Mid Continent NMRA Regional Convention and operation on the El & El. One of the trains on the El & El's schedule is called the Schoolbug.

It runs from Caddo Gap, Arkansas, to Glenwood, Arkansas every morning to take kids to the consolidated school in Glenwood. It continues on to El Dorado and then makes an afternoon return to pick the kids up and take them home to Caddo Gap. Jim was looking through some books I have showing Rock Island motive power and saw a bug very much like the one in this article. He thought it would be the perfect motive power to haul a coach and a boxcar or two as the El & El Schoolbug. I mentioned that I just happened to have an undecorated version on hand and he decided to take it back to California and turn it into the model you see in this article.

One of the great rewards in this hobby has been the friendships I have made. This Doodlebug is special because it represents both my childhood and a very good railroading friend.

### Looking Back by Dave Connery, MMR, PCR Historian

#### Voices – An Interview with Frank Markovich, MMR

Frank Markovich is first and foremost a model builder. He began building models about age 5 and has never stopped. Some of his earliest memories are of flying model airplanes about



once a month with a cousin in the Half Moon Bay area. He started with plastic models – planes, boats, cars – and especially construction equipment. Eventually this led to building paper and balsa wood planes, which he loved but he quickly learned that he would get dizzy trying to fly the planes from a string. This

led to radio controlled planes but this seemed just as bad. It was disappointing when Frank would build a nice looking plane only to have it crash and get turned back into a kit.

A bit later, about high school, Frank discovered scale model trains – which did not crash. He especially enjoys structure building. At first these were plastic models by Revell and Atlas and Frank built his first layout, a small - perhaps 4' X 6' - with some trains and employing snap track. He dreamed of something bigger and worked on this layout off and on through college. Frank attended several Bay Area schools and graduated from San Francisco State and then obtained a Masters of Education. With Prop. 13 his adult division high school teaching job disappeared in 1978, the same year he married his wife, Susie.

That same year Colin Emerson introduced Frank to the NMRA through a hobby shop on 25th Avenue in San Mateo. Frank had seen some beautiful models on display built by Colin so Frank called him and he invited Frank over. Colin showed Frank how he finished and weathered buildings, most of which were Fine Scale Miniature models. Frank bought a couple of

FSM kits, built the first one according to the instructions and then started making changes to the second kit he built.

Frank entered his first contest at a Coast Division Meet at Reardon High School in the 1978-79 timeframe. At a Coast Meet he met Mic Greenberg. Mic taught Frank a lot of modeling techniques. During this time Frank finished an engineering degree. Mic was working at Ampex and he recruited Frank to work there. Once a week they would take a long lunch and go to a hobby shop together, compensating for the time by working at their desks during lunch on other days.

At this time Frank was building an HOn3 layout in the basement of their home in Daly City. This layout did not operate well. The small Shay locomotives would stall unless run at an un-prototypical fast speed, which bothered Frank. While attending a PCR Convention in Santa Rosa, Frank stopped at the Precision Scale booth. They had a Mich-Cal 13-ton T-boiler On3 Shay running back and forth on a short section of track and running at a prototypical slow speed. Frank watched this for hours – entranced at the perfection of the mechanism and expecting it to stall at any minute. It never did and Frank became hooked on On3.

In 1981 Frank was Contest Chair for the NMRA National Convention held in San Mateo. At this convention Frank won several first places in the "kit" category. The awards for that event were lanterns – which he thought were really cool!

In December, 1985 Frank and Susie moved into their present home in Belmont – by then they had two sons, Frankie and Michael. Their daughter Christine was born in 1988. They hired someone to dig out under the house, removing about 40 yards of dirt, rock and clay, which provided space for a finished room. Frank then began to build a logging themed On3 railroad in this 16' X 22' room.

Frank was Coast Division Contest Chair for at least 5 years and then ran a youth modeling program at the Coast Meets. He got all the materials for these sessions donated from local hobby shops and manufacturers (unfortunately most of these hobby stores are now gone).

During these years Frank also had a regular column on Narrow Gauge Modeling in the *NMRA Bulletin* (now the *NMRA Magazine*). Frank continued to build models for contest entry and stayed active in the hobby until in the mid-1990's. At that time Frank took a break from the hobby to spend more time with his wife and three kids and be involved with them in their activities. This was also a time when Frank was working long hours at his day job.

Frank had started teaching guitar in Adult Education right after he graduated from SF State. Then he was hired to teach guitar at Skyline College. He had his interview on Friday and the first class was Saturday – the next morning. This was in 1971 and he continued teaching as a part-time career for 47 years and instructed over 5,000 students.

Frank again became active in the hobby in 2006. By this time all three of his kids were grown. Frank finished his On3 layout, did a lot of model building and wrote several articles for the *Narrow Gauge and Short Line Gazette* and he won a number of contests. To support the NMRA recruitment effort Frank and Mike Blumensaadt, MMR built three "Build a Memory" layouts, which were a regular part of the NMRA membership booth at Bay Area Train Shows. The two of them did this for over 8 years, building one HO layout and two N scale layouts and showing them 2 or 3 times each year.

Frank took responsibility for running the West Side Reunion in 2014 and has been able to increase participation and enthusiasm for this annual event held each spring in Sonora, California. Frank was elected Superintendent of Coast Division in 2012 and held this position for four years. He is currently in his second term as Coast Director on the PCR Board of Directors. He was an active member of the Yosemite Short Line On30 portable layout for 10 years. He often attends both NMRA National and National Narrow Gauge Conventions and has won about 10 first places in the NMRA National Convention Contests, along with numerous PCR Contests. Frank has also provided clinics on his modeling techniques at Coast Division and PCR events. Frank was on the National Committee on Recruitment and Retention in 2015-16. He became NMRA Master Model Railroader #514 in

2014. He was Coast Member of the Year in 2014 and received the PCR Presidents Award in 2015. He has also written articles for *N-Scale Magazine*.

Building models remains his prime interest and he often alternates between building a craftsman kit and scratch-building a model, keeping his interest and enthusiasm strong. He especially enjoys building structures, vehicles and caterpillars. While he is not personally into operations he understands why that is the most interesting aspect of the hobby for many. He runs trains on his layout infrequently – usually hosting a layout open house for visits 1 or 2 times a year and showing the layout room to people who visit their home.

Susie and Frank enjoy riding trains and attending model railroad conventions. His favorite convention is the National Narrow Gauge Convention – the very best modeling in the country can be viewed in their contests. Frank particularly enjoys narrow gauge railroads and he models a fictional line called the "Twain Harte and Sonora Pass", based on the West Side Lumber Company and incorporating many West Side prototype models and as you can see, he is a consummate model builder.

#### **Innovators In Model Railroading**

#### HOW A PERSONAL TOOL BE-CAME A THRIVING BUSINESS -THE STORY OF FASTTRACKS

Model railroaders are relentlessly creative and well-known for creating their own tools to solve a particular model or layout fabrication problem. Usually these tools are simple, if clever,

and used only by individual modelers or occasionally described and shown in online forums. But what happens when an unusually innovative tool causes modelers to demand commercial production? This is the story of East Tracks Hobby-


production? This is the story of Fast Tracks Hobbyworks, Inc. of Port Dover, Canada.

Fast Tracks CEO Tim Warris grew up a short distance from former Grand Trunk trackage, then operated by Norfolk & Western, in small-town southern Ontario and became active in model railroading at an early age. Years later, after starting a family, he started the HO scale Port Kelsey Railway, which was featured in the August 1997 Model Railroader. A switching layout, it had 100% traditional code 70 hand laid track with #4 turnouts. (You can revisit it in Tim's blog, no longer updated, at http://www.port-kelsey.com/.) This was followed by two more layouts with hand laid track that were mostly satisfying, yet still a little frustrating because the turnout geometry was imperfect. This experience caused Tim to realize that the difference between perfect reliability and problems is merely a few thousandths of an inch.

By 2002, Tim had completed education as a machinist, then began planning a layout based on the Bronx Terminal Railroad, the prototype of which had exceptionally complex trackage. Faced with the need to efficiently build dozens of turnouts that had to operate reliably, Tim realized there had to be a better way than traditional construction. The Bronx Terminal build inspired him to try using CNC milling machines to cut a turnout construction fixture in plywood. While his plywood prototype worked well, it did not accommodate ties, and began to wear out. This inspired Tim to make #4, #5, and #6 fixtures, both left-



hand and right, in CNC milled aluminum. (For an example, see the image below.) These worked extremely well.



The Bronx Terminal concept was put aside, and Tim pivoted to constructing a two-deck HO layout that incorporated the Port Kelsey; while it was underway, he worked on a large club layout nearby. During a layout tour there, he happened to leave the fixtures on display and modeler interest was instantaneous, with numerous requests for copies. The first person to ask was Clark Kooning, now Vice President of Administration for NMRA and a veteran user of Fast Tracks products in NMRA Modeling with the Masters® programs.

In 2003, Tim worked with a family member to create and launch an attractive website for promotions and sales, then delighted as orders began arriving.

He also acquired a new CNC machine to produce them and developed fixtures that accommodated PC board ties in slots in the tool

This transition wasn't perfectly smooth; the new CNC machine suffered a power supply failure immediately and would not cut with the precision that Tim needed, requiring extensive interaction with its manufacturer over several weeks to work out bugs. Fortunately, customer feedback was excellent, and sales began to take off.

By 2004, making and selling Fast Tracks products had become a full-time occupation and Tim had to hire his first employee. Significant sales were realized at Fast Tracks' first trade show appearance at the 2005 NMRA convention in Cincinnati, Ohio. Fast Tracks has exhibited and sold at virtually every NMRA national convention since.

While the majority of customers are in North America, Fast Tracks has significant sales in Australia, Europe, Japan, Israel, South Africa, Russia and elsewhere. The company operates today with up to five employees, depending on demand.

Tim also has diversified into products other than track construction fixtures. Seeking a consistent source to supply wood ties to customers, Tim acquired the Mount Albert Lumber brand of strip wood and wood kits, relocating that business to Canada. Beyond wood and PC board ties, Fast Tracks also offers flex track curvature tools; rail curving tools; tie cutting jigs; rail; and acts a reseller for turnout controls, frog powering circuits, and other products.

Fast Tracks has continued to develop new kits under the Mount Albert brand. Its next release, formally announced at the National Narrow Gauge Convention, is a craftsman structure representing a chair manufacturer, "Last Resort Chair Co.", in O scale. (see photos at right) Also released recently is The Lumber Store, a rotating tubular strip wood storage rack sold with or without a complete stock of wood; the product is available with wood dimensioned for several different scales.

New Fast Tracks products are currently cut by Tim's





original CNC machine, now 15 years old. However, Fast Tracks recently acquired a new fully automated 4 -axis CNC machining center that can cut multiple products consecutively without operator interaction. Tim expects this machine to permit significant expansion into products other than track fixtures; those are unannounced as of this writing.

In speaking with *Branch Line*, Tim also reflected on the challenges of turning a hobby into a business. "You spend a lot of time learning accounting," Tim said. "While you'll spend a ton of time perfecting your products, it's just as important to have great-running, well organized.

portant to have great-running, well organized accounting systems to manage revenue and taxes."

He also noted the importance of establishing a business and not just a job, by creating written procedures for all major functions of the business and all products. The memorialization of these procedures and instructions becomes the foundation of a business that others can enter and learn, or that can be sold in the future.

Tim also believes the future of the hobby is bright, and that the number of modelers is far larger than indicated by association membership, magazine readership or train show attendance numbers. Fast Tracks currently ships up to

4,000 orders per year, a remarkable number for a company still focused on hand laid track. (The company's website is www.handlaidtrack.com.)

While Tim is modest in describing the business, it's not an understatement to say that Fast racks track assembly fixtures and kits have revolutionized the process of building bulletproof hand laid track for model railroaders in practically all scales.




