From The President

From the President

Welcome to another great issue of Branch Line as we enter the summer model railroading season. I extend a hearty thank you to Ed Merrin and Carol Alexander, our past President and Vice President, for their years of service to our members, as well as gratitude to all of you for the confidence expressed by your votes for me to serve.

We have just completed a great 2019 regional convention at McClellan and I offer many thanks to Sierra Division for trying a different kind of convention facility and for running a strong program of clinics, layout tours and other activities. As you'll read elsewhere in this issue, preparations for our 2020 convention at Concord are well underway and Coast Division has assembled a great team of volunteers. More help is needed in several key areas, though! Please contact Dave Connery and offer a hand. Our conventions succeed only because of you.

At McClellan, our Treasurer Bob Osborn presented a detailed financial report. While PCR is projected to operate at a net loss in the current fiscal year, Bob has invested our cash reserves in interest-bearing CDs and, without unforeseen significant losses on events, these interest earnings should make PCR cashflow positive in two years. Nevertheless, I expect we will be asking all of you to make a small donation in the coming years to help fund PCR activities, as it is increasingly difficult to operate PCR in the black when many of our conventions and other activities are held in California, a high-cost state. Hotel food & beverage charges, audiovisual equipment charges and event space fees mean that almost all our conventions will lose money if we are to hold down registration fees and host conventions in comfortable, convenient locations.

The simplest way to donate is to pay PCR's \$8 subscription fee when you renew your national NMRA membership. Although we will discontinue mailing copies of Branch Line in October you'll get them by e-mail instead—over time PCR has substituted software and online services for our printing and publication costs, and these services are not free. We use Constant Contact for e-mail service, FormSite for online convention registrations, PayPal for payments and other software and services. All carry fees. To offset these costs, we need your annual donation of \$8 to fund all our media services. It's a small price to pay for the level of connection to the modeling world that we provide. And if you have not provided an e-mail address to NMRA yet (about 25% of you have not), please do so at your next renewal. While some changes in the world are hard to face, the reality for NMRA and across the hobby is that electronic communications are how business is now done.

Frank Markovich and I are committed to meeting and chatting with more of you in the coming year. On June 2 we attended Coast Division's quarterly event and spoke at length with a few dozen members. On June 15 I attended the Bay Area Prototype Modelers event in Richmond to check out some of the best modeling going on in the region—PCR is a co-sponsor of this great event. On June 29 we visit the eastern region of Daylight Division with a pizza lunch at Chuck Harmon's house. There may

still be space when you read this article—contact Chuck, Neil Fernbaugh or me at once. On July 27 I'll be in the western region of Daylight for its quarterly event in Goleta. And later in the autumn and into winter we expect to visit Redwood Empire Division and Sierra Division respectively; those details are pending.



When these visits are announced, please consider joining us to discuss any issue about PCR, NMRA's national operations, or any aspect of the model railroading hobby. We're here to listen, provide information and consider new events, services or organizational changes to benefit you,

In support of those efforts, I continue to maintain close contact with your NMRA national leadership. I am managing NMRA's trademark and patent legal activities, in connection with General Counsel Bob Amsler; I have become active on the Regional Advisory Committee (RAC) to the national Board and will be assisting in nominating a national Director; I've been in touch this month with national President Pete Magoun and VP Frank Koch on various issues. I'll be attending the national Board of Directors meeting at the 2019 Salt Lake City convention, as usual. PCR is unusual in having this level of regular contact with the national leadership, so please take advantage of it—if I can assist with advising on or resolving any national-level issue, contact me

Most of the activities above have a strong social component and that's why many of us are in NMRA. But let's keep building models, visiting and operating layouts as well. As a reminder, Coast Division has formed a "Golden Spike Lion Team" that is ready and able to visit your layout, verify you've met the (very simple) requirements for the Golden Spike Award in NMRA's Achievement Program, and get the award to you. Every month the NMRA Magazine prints lists of recent AP certificate awardees, and PCR is under-represented. I encourage each of you to take a fresh look at the AP—you may have already completed most requirements just by building models or your layout.




As the semaphore shows and the convention name says, we are CLEAR TO THE COAST for PCR's 2020 convention at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Concord from April 30 through May 2, 2020. The Crowne Plaza was the site of the *Devil Mountain* convention in 2005 and the 1987 convention *Milepost* 87.

The hotel room rate is \$134 plus applicable taxes. Once the room block opens in September 2019, rooms can be booked from as early as April 26, 2020 for occupancy as late as May 5, all at the convention rate. As always, the success of PCR's convention depends in part on the number of room nights booked, so attendees are strongly encouraged to stay in the convention hotel. It's also more convenient; hotel parking is gate controlled but overnight guests have easy, in-and-out access with their room key. Convention registrants not staying in the hotel will receive parking validation stickers, but separate processing will be needed each time you leave the parking lot. Avoid this inconvenience by booking overnight at the hotel.



Registration is now open on the convention website www.pcrnmra.org/conv2020 or with the registration form in this issue of the Branchline. Early Bird registration is \$130, and First Timer is \$110. Non-rail and Youth registrations are \$40 but do not include the awards banquet. Day fares are available at \$40 per day and also do not include the banquet if purchased for Saturday. The Early Bird rate is good through November 30, 2019, which is a month earlier than last year.





PCR

The 2020 convention will include all of the regular PCR convention features - contests, clinics, layout tours, ops sessions, a non-rail program and a prototype trip. New features are also planned. For those who attended the joint convention with PNR in Medford in 2012, you may recall the mini-clinic session on Friday evening with numerous short clinics running simultaneously in one large room. Mini-clinics will be offered in PCR for 2020, in addition to the over 40 regular clinic sessions scheduled. An opening night reception is planned. The Square Foot Challenge, a popular-vote modeling contest, is certain to attract lots of creative entries. To enter, create any form of modeling, display or diorama in a space 12" x 12" and that is railroad related and includes a section of track. The Challenge was well received in the Coast Division and we expect the same enthusiastic participation from the rest of the region. So get started early on your entry.

The 2020 convention is co-sponsored by the Western Railway Museum in Rio Vista. PCR will enjoy an exclusive tour on Friday when the Museum is closed to the public, including a BBQ lunch, shop tour and ride on one or more of WRM's preserved historic electric trolleys or other rail cars. Bus transportation is planned for what promises to be a great day.

The 2020 convention will feature up to 40 clinics—so lots of clinicians are needed! Richard Brennan, Clinics chair, needs your help in filling clinic slots. Have you ever thought of giving a clinic but are uncomfortable in standing in front of an entire clinic room for an hour? Try the mini-clinics to get your feet wet with a small group for half the normal duration. Or do you



have a great idea that doesn't have an hour's worth of content, here's the opportunity for that too. Of course Richard would also like to hear from you for a full clinic slot. Contact him at ctcclinics@pcrnmra.org.

The 2019 convention offered a full operations session on the Sacramento Central Railroad modular Layout. In 2020, the California Central Coast On30 Modular Group will offer a large layout for operations, with trains staged to be dispatched in to pick up and set-out cars en route from the yard to a local operations area in sessions lasting 30 to 45 minutes in length. This will be a great low-stress way to try operations if you haven't done so previously.

Dr. Seuss, Oh, The Places You'll Go!


Do you hear these rhymes from the past still echoing in the present? They represent exhortations to achieve great things in life and to not just be a

Achievement Program - Model Railroad Engineer - Electrical

Continuing our discussion on various AP certificates, this month we will talk about the requirements for Model Railroad Engineer - Electrical. Like the other certificates, the full requirements for this category are available on the Internet at the NMRA website.

The essence of this AP certificate is to demonstrate knowledge of wiring a model

railroad. The required work can be done on your own layout, a club layout, or even some on a friend's layout.

I will talk about the first two requirements this month and the rest of the requirements in the next issue of the **Branch Line**.

The first requirement is that you construct and demonstrate the satisfactory operation of an electrical control system on a model railroad capable of simultaneous and independent control of two mainline trains in either direction and containing at least a) five electrical blocks if running DC or, for DCC, sufficient gaps and switches to maintain polarity, phase if needed, and troubleshooting; and b) one mainline passing siding; and c) one reversing loop, wye, or turntable; and d) one yard with a minimum of three tracks and a switching lead independent of the mainline; and e) facilities for the storing of at least two unused motive power units; and f) one power supply with protective devices. Note that you do not need to build a power supply as long as it includes the required protective device. While this might seem like a long list, note that even a small DCC layout could qualify if there is a way to turn motive power and it includes a small yard, a passing track, and circuit breakers.

The next requirement is that you wire and demonstrate the electrical operation of at least three of the following items: turnout, crossing, crossover, double crossover, slip switch, gauge separation turnout, double gauge separation turnout, three-way turnout, gauntlet turnout, spring switch, or an operating switch in an overhead wire. You do not need to scratchbuild any of these track components, just show that you can make them work electrically. For example, wiring up the simplest powered turnout from the hobby shop will satisfy one of the three required electrical track components. Likewise, most commercial crossings come prewired. All you need to do it set one up so that you can run trains through both tracks. The whole point of these requirements is for you to demonstrate a variety of skills and understand the need for track gaps, etc. The guidelines

continually stress to not read more into the requirements than need be or make them harder than they have to be.

I'll talk about the rest of the requirements in the next issue

Once you complete these requirements, submit a Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) which includes the required drawings and forms. Witnesses must sign a *Certificate of Operation* verifying that the required items are operational and meet all applicable NMRA standards. Send the completed SOQ to your Divisional AP representative, along with a photocopy of your NMRA membership card and you are on your way toward another certificate!

Mike Blumensaadt was awarded an AP Certificate for Master Builder - Prototype Models. You may have seen his N scale Civil War scene at the 2015 PCR Convention or in the September 2015 issue of **Model Railroader** magazine. Great work Mike!

Richard Brennan recorded 210 TUs for Association Volunteer! His work included over six years as *Branch Line* editor which alone was worth 184 TUs!

Build a Barn from Scratch. Part 3

Before the rains come, we need to fashion a covering for that roofless barn we constructed last time. Roofs are always prominent features on scale model buildings, so special

effort is justified in creating a convincing representation. Continuing my tactic of putting in extra hours in order to save money, I decided to scratch-build a shake roof for the barn. The result was easier and less time-consuming than I expected.

For the gable roof, I started with two panels of 1/64-inch thick plywood, cut slightly oversize so they could be trimmed to fit after the shakes were applied. After calculating how many strips of shakes I would need, allowing 1/8-inch as the width of each strip, I set the panels aside and went to work on the shakes.

Creating the shake shingles consumed the most time for this project, but considering the cost of commercial products (over \$10 for a sheet the size of a large postcard) and the ease of the method I used, this part was also the most satisfying. Here are the materials and tools I used: plain 3" x 5" file cards, the same India ink and leather dye stains used for the foundation and walls (1 tsp. black ink in a pint of isopropyl rubbing alcohol, 1 tsp. brown leather dye in another pint), Pan Pastel 740.3 Burnt Sienna Shade, a small brush, and a pair of scissors. I also used an interesting scrapbooking tool called deckle-edge scissors, basically scissors with an irregular edge, but this is entirely optional.

The procedure I used is as follows:

Draw lines on the card parallel to a long edge and 1/4-inch apart

Use sharp scissors to make cuts perpendicular to one edge of the card (and perpendicular to the lines you drew). Each cut should be about 3/16-inch long and they should be randomly spaced between 1/16- and 1/8-inch apart

If you use the deckle-edge scissors, now is the time to make the card's edge ragged

Cut off this strip of shakes along the line nearest the edge of the card

Repeat the last three steps with the next strip at the new edge of the card

Continue the process until you have enough shakes for the whole roof, plus a few extra strips for experiments and/ or mistakes. This is a good activity to do while watching TV or listening to music.

Coloring the strips of shakes with a small brush was very easy. I began with four coats of the brown leather dye stain, making no effort to cover evenly—some variation in the coverage adds to

the realism. I followed this with two coats of the black India ink stain. To get a more reddish-brown result, I finished by brushing on some of the Burnt Sienna Shade from Pan Pastel.

The next order of business was to attach the shakes to the 1/64-inch plywood roof panels I set aside much earlier. I began by drawing parallel guide lines on the plywood, 1/4-inch apart. Apply the strips starting at the eaves and working up to the peak. For each strip, I applied a bead of Aleene's Original Tacky Glue, then pressed a shake strip into the glue and used a coffee stirring stick to carefully adjust it to be perfectly straight and parallel to the guide lines. Each successive strip must overlap the previous one, covering the top part of the strip which was not sliced through between the shakes. When I finished fastening the shakes to one plywood panel, I placed it on a piece of glass and weighted it down with a heavy book to dry.

After both roof panels were thoroughly dry, I glued two lengths of 3/8-inch square poplar to the underside of each panel to stiffen it and, by extending below the tops of the walls, to fix the panel's position on the walls. I cut three triangular pieces of the 1/8-inch

thick MDF to match the pitch of the roof and glued one edge of each to the poplar stiffeners on one of the roof panels. When these three glue joints were dry, I glued the second panel to the upper edges of those triangular pieces to complete a removable roof.



To finish it off, I trimmed it to size and added a tar paper strip

along the peak. The "tar paper" strip was created by "painting" a piece of cardstock with a black permanent marker, creasing it, cutting it out with an X-acto knife, and gluing it in place with Formula '560' Canopy Glue.



With the roof in place, I released the sun, wind, and rain to age it. In this production, the part of the elements was played by Bragdon Enterprises weathering chalks, applied with a stiff brush.

My HO scale barn is now ready to serve the farmer who owns the property adjoining my model railroad's cannery spur. The techniques I first tried out on this project—stone foundations from gravel, individual wooden boards from thin basswood sheets, and roof shakes from 3 x 5 file cards—will certainly find their way into future structures. Tales of the Santa Cruz Northern

No Claws, No Wedgies and No Fat Tires - 2

So, we covered Fat Tires and Claws (and a bit of philosophy) two columns ago. What's next? "Wedgies!"

Wedgies are those badly oversized, triangle shaped 'things' that represent ladder rungs and grab irons on so many older hoppers and covered hoppers in our fleets. They don't have to be that

way, as newer models have shown. So, the goal here is to replace those wedgies without excruciating pain... we will add new parts without a lot of drilling!

Out comes the Xuron rail cutter, X-Acto knife with fresh (and I do mean brand new, fresh, like really SHARP) #11 blade, files, sand paper and scale sized brass rod. The Xuron takes care of the major surgery in short order, but you have to be careful not to stress the corner vertical posts where the side and end ladder rungs connect. Then comes close trimming (X-Acto) and some final sanding and filing to clean up the inner surfaces (files, 220# or 400# sand paper). I left the ends of the rungs / grab irons on the car sides / vertical posts to represent bolts as needed. I remove a bit of paint below each of these. The Xuron cutters get an encore to cut the brass rod to length to fit under the bolt heads. I then ACC the rungs and grab irons in place and touch up the paint. While not as secure as drilling holes to mount formed grab irons, I only have to replace one or two grabs / rungs a year on a fleet of 50 or so such cars. Seems worth it when you can avoid trying to keep the corner verticals intact while drilling five, six or seven .0225" or smaller (your choice) holes. Take a look at the photos of the two SP covered cement hoppers...

How about roof walks? Depends on your era, pocket book and aesthetic, of all things. . In the SCN's 1971 era most older boxcars had already had their roof walks removed and cars built from 1966 onward were built without them. But there are still a few boxcars running around with them, plus covered hoppers. Many modelers use the etched brass or stainless steel replacement roofwalks available from several of our manufacturers. These are very nice, but I personally think that they are too thin – seriously. The prototype metal roofwalks I have had

measure are made of pressed and formed steel. The sides and ends are bent down to form what is effectively a channel shape when the roofwalk is looked at in cross section. And these sides and ends present a face about 1 ½ inches tall. I use Kadee or Tichy aftermarket plastic roofwalks, which appear to me to be have the correct side and end thickness. I will use etched metal ones if needed for a specific car, or – I can take a stock plastic roofwalk, bevel the undersides of the sides and ends to reduce the visible edge and use a black wash to give depth to the top surface. A pencil run lightly over the top grating will give a bit more relief...

Each car is different, sometimes the car sides are thick enough to carefully drill mounting holes into with a #74 drill after removing the originals. Other times I take a page from noted freight car historian and modeler Tony Thompson's notebook and glue small rectangles of styrene to the underbody at the ends and drill the mounting holes into them.

For myself, I add cut levers to every car on the railroad. These can be a bit fussy to install. You can buy preformed ones – I usually just bend my own from .012" brass wire. And I

buy bags of Detail Associates 2206 Eye Bolts almost every time I am in a hobby shop to support the outside ends of the cut levers. Does this seem a bit much? All I can say is I have never seen a real railroad car without them. 'Nuf said on this one – a personal choice.

This of course does not cover even half of the work one could do to upgrade a given car. But it is a good start (read major improvements) and something anyone can accomplish if they want. As the photos of the cement hoppers show you can have a fleet of well detailed upgraded cars equal to the current crop of excellent models if you are willing to do some work.

One last thought – 'But Jim, won't all this work suffer during operating sessions?" Hmmm, well a little, maybe. Every so often something gets damaged, and it is usually easy to fix or replace. The SCN is a railroad, it operates. I wouldn't ever

want to be held hostage to the things I own or the work I have done!

Stirrup steps are another fruitful area. You can thin them with files, you can scrape the insides of many painted ones to expose the underlying black plastic on many cars which again makes them seem much thinner, or you can replace them. Bags of A-Line formed



metal stirrup steps are like candy to me - I can't buy just one bag it seems.

Looking Back by Dave Connery, MMR, PCR Historian Voices – An Interview Steve and Carol Skold

Steve Started Our Interview by showing me a photo of him at one year old sitting under a Christmas Tree with a three rail train running around Steve and the tree so we know he got started in model railroading at a



very early age. Actually, Steve's first train that he remembers was an American Flyer train that he got at age 7 or 8. His dad liked the two-rail system and so opted for Flyer. This was when Steve and his family were living in San Francisco – it was a

set with a 4-6-2 and early plastic cars. This eventually got boxed up and turned over to Steve's sister – who had five boys and it became their train set and today Steve thinks it is with Tim and Carol Shilling in Albuquerque, NM.

Carol remembers attending Water polo games and meeting Steve there. She grew up in Stockton and does not have many early memories of trains except for when visiting her grandmother in Redding. As a young girl she remembers hearing the train coming and running down to the crossing to see the train slowing as it approached the depot a few blocks away. She would wave to the enginemen and they would always wave back.

After college in 1963 Steve was accepted into the US Navy and attended Pre-flight training where he got commissioned as an Ensign and received his wings as a Naval Flight Officer. As a Navigator he was assigned to a school in San Diego to learn to also serve as a Tactical Coordinator. At this time he got back into model railroading with a small 2' X 4' layout and it was during this period he purchased his first brass locomotive – a V&T 4-4-0 "Reno" for \$24.50. The Skolds were next transferred to Whidbey Island, Washington and Steve again had a small layout in a shed at the back of the carport, which he worked on between several deployments to South East Asia.

In 1967 the Skolds were released from active service and moved to Santa Rosa, where Steve first worked as a stockbroker and a short time later became an underwriter for State Farm Insurance. They purchased their current home in Santa Rosa in 1968. The next year Steve got back into model railroading and rejoined the NMRA (at the time a Life Membership cost \$100 and was one of the best investments Steve has ever made). He also became a Life Member of the Pacific Coast Region (note:

life memberships are no longer available in either the National or Regional organizations). At this time Steve learned of the Redwood Empire Divi-

sion and got involved and has been active in the Division ever since. It was at this time that Steve began building his first of three layouts in the garage, this effort a 16' X 16' HO layout that was suspended from the ceiling so Carol could still park her car in the garage. The layout would be winched up into the rafters when Steve was not working on it.

Steve met Harold Mentzer, who was living in Laytonville at the time and every Wednesday evening Harold would drive down to Santa Rosa and help Steve with this first version of the Whiskeytown and Shasta RR. Soon Dave Dorance and a few others joined in the Wednesday night group and it became the Sonoma County Hi-Ballers, who still meet every Wednesday evening and have been for 49 years now. This was 1970 and Steve attended his first PCR convention, which was held in Palo Alto that year.

Steve and Harold Mentzer thought they were asked to put on the 1973 PCR Convention. When Steve wrote to Whit Towers to ask if there were any guidelines on how to run a convention, Whit replied with a two-page mimeographed description and the news that because of some problem they were now needed to put on the 1972 PCR Convention. Thus, Steve became chair of the 1972 convention, which was held at the El Rancho Tropicana Hotel – a good venue for our conventions. At the convention they met.

Steve has always been active in Redwood Empire Division ac-

tivities. From 1974 to 1978 he served as PCR Director from RED. During this timeframe, he also served the Division as Callboard Editor, Contest Chairman, Membership Chairman, Program Chairman, Chief Clerk and Superintendent. Frank Slater asked Carol to help Arleta Elmore with the PCR Contests, then during Harold Mentzer's terms as PCR President 1978-82 Carol served as PCR Contest Chair. Carol was also involved with Shirley Mentzer in providing sandwiches and cookies for RED meets.

tion most years.

In those years, they would often have 120 models to judge, banquet was already underway. She also helped with the Photo Contest at O-Scale West. In addition, over the years Carol has won awards in the Photo Contest, Railroadiana and one time in the model contest with a reworked V&T 2-6-0 locomotive. Carol did all this and raised three daughters! For the 1979 Convention Steve was the Manufacturers Exhibit Chairman and in that year Carol and Steve were jointly awarded the prestigious John Allen Award.

It was also in 1979 that Steve began to do some On3 modeling. His first model in this scale was of a caboose. In 1980 Steve decided to dismantle the HO layout as the Hi-ballers had Don Cabral's Hessel & Lone Pine layout to operate on. Steve started to construct his second layout in the garage, an On3 version of the Whiskeytown & Shasta. This was built up high so Carol still had a way to get her car in the garage and necessitated working on the layout from temporary scaffolding – made from boards laid on top of saw-horses. One night there was a near tragedy when someone climbed off one end of the scaffolding the person on the other end suddenly crashed to the ground. This happened in the mid-1980's and convinced Steve that what they were doing was too dangerous. So it was again dismantled and for the third edition – another On3 layout which started as a couple of modules built on hollow-core doors and later incorporated into the around the walls layout. Steve has always enjoyed the Narrow Gauge Convention format better than the NMRA plan so while he has only attended 3 NMRA National Conventions he goes to the National Narrow Gauge Conven-

In the 1980's Steve was also involved in sailboat racing on San Francisco Bay (C-15 and O'Day Day Sailor's) and crewing on racing boats. The sailing boats slowed down Steve's model railroading until his knees started to give out and he found our hobby easier on these critically important joints. In his post sailing time Steve has served as Chairman of the Mini-vention held in Santa Rosa in 2011 - same

year as the NMRA Convention in Sacramento. He was Chief Clerk which meant they did not finish the final award tallies until the of RED from 2011 until 2014, Superintendent of RED from 2014 to 2017 and is currently serving as Director from RED, a term that expires in 2020 and Steve says is his last. In 2006 Steve was RED Member of the Year, and in 2011 Steve garnered the PCR Presidents Award. Not to be out done, Carol received the PCR Presidents Award in 2018.

> When asked if she had any suggestions for spouses, Carol suggested a spouse find a part of the hobby they can enjoy and do that and allow the spouse railroader to participate as they see fit. It can be as simple as feeding the crew when they come to the layout or at meetings, or going to a convention and taking advantage of what is planned for spouses or just going shopping in a new town while the RR person enjoys clinics, etc. She and her cousin always figured they could justify spending money on fun stuff while the guys were buying railroad goodies; or they can volunteer to help with the event such as sitting at the registration desk, passing out goodie bags, etc. This way a couple can enjoy the time that is available for both to enjoy like "happy hour", banquets, layout tours, annual breakfast (the meeting takes very little time) or maybe exploring a new area after the activity is finished.

> Steve and Carol enjoy both the social and modeling aspects of our hobby. They have especially enjoyed conventions in Colorado (National Narrow Gauge) where they get to ride on the C&TS and the D&S NG. In 2006 they got to ride in the sole surviving operational goose about half way from Durango to Silver ton and return – an unforgettable journey. It should be clear from the above that both Steve and Carol have made a very significant contribution to PCR and have been especially critical to the success of Redwood Empire Division. We should all be thankful for Steve and Carol and for the many ways they have improved our enjoyment of this hobby.

Redwood Empire Division Report
