

Here is what Frank had to say about this in the June 2023 NMRA Magazine:

I want to talk just a bit about the real advantage of serving the NMRA as an officer of the Division or Region. While I met many members in the Division I was serving as a Superintendent, I didn't get to know members of the other Divisions. That all changed when I became a director and started meeting all the Region's members. I now have friends throughout the Region. To me, that is the best part of serving. When I moved up to the Vice-President and then the President, I met many members outside the PCR Region. As President, there are regular meetings (Zoom) with other Region Presidents, which has benefited me and the Region in the long term. I can bring back what is happening to the members. Also, it allows me to hear what is working in other Regions and communicate what is working in the PCR! - Frank Markovich, MMR®, PCR President

Chip and I plan to move the region forward on multiple fronts over the next couple of years. Personally, I am focused on communications, recruiting, and member engagement. As we begin 2025, there are some new focus areas for the PCR

First, we need to reduce the number of contacts in our Constant Contact email application. Due to conventions and others, we have accumulated almost 2,500 contacts and our account is limited to 2,500 and the next step is very expensive. To resolve this, we are going to ask all of the non-members to sign up to receive PCR (or divisional emails). This will let us have a member mailing list and a separate list of those that have subscribed for PCR emails. Look for emails about this. If you are not a PCR member, make sure you register for the "Friends of the PCR" email list.

Let your friends outside the PCR know.

Second, as many of you know, the recruiting campaign the PCR started a couple of years ago has been successful in signing up over 100 new members through RailPasses. We are focused on recruiting as, with over 750 members in the PCR, our annual attrition of 7-10% means we need to recruit 60-100 new members each year to maintain an active roster level (depending on how many stay after the RailPass trial). However, our recruiting efforts are limited by the small number of events and hobby shops where we can meet other model railroaders. One suggestion is to have a program to encourage current members to sign up their modeling friends to the PCR. This program is currently being developed. If you have interest in being on the committee, please contact Phil Edholm at <a href="mailto:coastsup23@gmail.com">coastsup23@gmail.com</a>.

Finally, several members have suggested that facilitating smaller local meetups would be great. In a recent PCR groups io survey, local coffee meets were suggested as a way to build local contacts and modeling. While each of the Division Superintendents can parse the current NMRA member roster for geography, we do not have any other modeling demographic information. We are considering a program to allow all PCR members to register their modeling scales and interests. This will enable the Divisional teams to connect modelers both based on geography and their interests. For example, all of the N scale modelers in an area could be connected to see if they would like to do an activity. If you are interested helping define the demographic parameters we should be seeking or would like to get involved in the process, please contact me at



Have you joined the NMRA Interchange? It's the newest tool to help you connect with other members, gain knowledge and learn to modeling techniques. The Interchange is hosted on the Discord application which is available for Windows, Apple OS, Android and Apple devices. See instructions below for signing up.

#### Joining the NMRA Interchange

Have you joined the Interchange yet? If not, follow these steps to get connected!

- 1. Go to nmra.org/nmra-interchange
- 2. It will ask you to log in to the NMRA website if you're not already logged in. If you are not registered with the NMRA website yet, now's the time to do it. Click the "Need a username? Register now" button, and get set up. Use the email address on file in the NMRA membership system (probably the one where you got this eBulletin). The system will email you a link to set your password.
- 3. Now you should be in the **NMRA Interchange** page. If not, click this link.
- 4. Click on Member Info in the top right corner and scroll down get your exact Member ID. You'll need that later.
- 5. Read through the page and then follow the "Interchange Server Invite" link at the bottom. This is a special link just for you and will look something like <a href="https://discord.gg/xxxxxxx">https://discord.gg/xxxxxxx</a>
- 6. You will be taken to Discord (the platform that hosts the NMRA Interchange) where you will be prompted to sign in, if you already have an account there, or prompted to register, if not. If you need instructions for creating an account or logging into Discord they can be found **here**.
- 7. Once you accept the NMRA Interchange Invite, and you are logged in, you will land in **#the-lobby** with a message on what to do next.
- 8. We suggest that you read and agree to the **#rules** first. Just click on **#rules** and then click on "thumbs up". Then click on **#the-lobby** again to do the most important step.
- 9. Discord and the NMRA need to check with each other, in order to verify that you are a current NMRA member with an email on file. You start the process with the /onboardcommand. Now, this is very sensitive to the type of device you are using, so just type the first few letters /onb at the bottom where you see a + sign in a circle. It will complete the command for you in a pop-up just above that. Click on the /onboardcommand. Add your membership number (6 characters followed by a space and then two more characters) just as you noted in step 4. Example: /onboard input: 123456 0A
- 10. Discord and the NMRA computers will have a chat, and then you will receive an email containing a *l* **clearance** command. That's your entry ticket. Copy and paste the whole line into **#the-lobby** (at the + sign again). Example: /clearance input: 654321
- 11. You're in! You will not have to do any of this again. If anything derails, you'll get a message telling you what to do next, and we also have Moderators in the Interchange standing by to help.
- 12. If all went well, you'll now see more than 350 channels (those # things). We suggest you start by going to **#introduce-yourself** and then scroll up to **#the-workbench** to see what others have done and shared! Then find your Region and Division and say "hello" there. And then start participating and enjoy!



This year's convention committee elected to offer a virtual option for attendees. The virtual team was made up of John Abatecola, Cydney George-Abatecola, Rick Anderson and a great crew of room host volunteers. Special thanks go to Hilding Larson for set up help and equipment loans. As the core of this team had worked on virtual events before and embraced the goal of improvement with each virtual event run, new procedures and events were added to this year's virtual event to further the mission of making a virtual convention feel like an in person convention. We even entered the arena of social media promotion which resulted in good registration numbers. Thirty one of our attendees attended from out of state with 17 states being represented as well as Ontario. Shout out to Arizona, Florida, Ohio and Oregon for providing most of our out of state virtual attendees!

In the effort to improve virtual events, we added a few changes that ended up working well:

- We added a Zoom registration requirement to get the meeting link and then pared down the whole conventio's activities to one meeting code.
- We highlighted a different Special Interest Group each clinic day and included a special Meetup during the afternoon for attendees to learn more about them and ask questions. We focused on Women in Model Railroading SIG, Layout Design SIG and the Operations SIG. We got exciting updates on new activities within the OPSIG which included their new Facebook discussion group - "OPSIG".

PCR members were invited to virtually attend the General Member Meeting that is always held at the convention banquet or breakfast - we had 14 members attend on Zoom!



We brought back features like:

- Voting on which clinics would be on the virtual schedule
- Prototype tours (aka the "Virtual Excursion")
- The "New" schedule (clinics in the morning & evening with all the extra activities held in the afternoon)
- Layout tour of the modular group at the convention
- Contest room tour led by Earl Girbovan
- Vendor Meet & Greet
- Links to the clinic recordings to watch for 4 weeks after the convention and handout links.

Feedback during the convention from the virtual attendees confirmed that they were grateful for the virtual option so that they could attend or they wouldn't be able to attend at all. Most of our out of region attendees were there because they had attended virtual events we have done and loved it so much they came back. The new procedures and programs we tried worked well and the committee hopes they will be included in events going forward. The bottom line is that with no extra net cost, we were able to serve 50% more people, fulfilling the NMRA mission of advancing the global scale model railroading community through education, advocacy, standards, and social interaction. Although, one of our virtual attendees said it best.

"I value all events where we can learn and have fun -- I wish more regions had a virtual option!"

# The Answers Are Out There By Robert Pethoud A Portable Cannery: Part 4

This time we finish the cannery's brick structure with its rooftop water tank and the sign identifying it as Plant No. 7 of the California Packing Corporation.

### Sign

Del Monte was a brand of food products wholly owned by CalPak (the California Packing Corporation) in the 1940s and '50s. I decided that a name like this would suggest a cannery near the west coast in the time period that I model.

I used my computer to search for the well-known Del Monte logo and prepared my sign using a word processing program. The sign was printed on paper, cut out, and attached with rubber cement to a thin piece of plastic cut to the same shape. Finally, the plastic was at-

tached to the façade with rubber cement.



### **Water Tank**

My ITLA Industrial Building "D" (HO4152) came with a staircase exit and two chimneys as rooftop detail parts. I decided to add a water tank to those details and, to avoid some scratch-building, ordered ITLA's HO 4154WT Roof Water Tank. This kit comes with parts to construct three identical water tanks, so I have two extras for future projects.

Construction begins with a drainpipe, which runs all the way from the top of the tank to the bottom of its trestle support, and it attaches to three circular wooden disks to which a wrapper is fastened to form the cylindrical tank. Unfortunately, this "pipe," which is provided in the kit, is a length of square-section laser-cut wood.

# Answers,

Since I did not relish the thought of sanding the bottom portion of this into a cylinder, I replaced it with a 3/32"-diameter plastic straw, which is commercially available as a stirring stick for coffee. Surprisingly, it turned out to be a perfect press fit without modification

I made a second change to the water tank: a more complex replacement to the roof. The roof ought to be octagonal, as attested by the kit's roof supports, but the covering supplied in the kit has only seven sections and comes with curved eaves. I chose to make my roof have eight sections and straight eaves. To make the roof conical, the kit's roof piece is a complete circle from which a 28° sector is to be removed. If you subtract this 28° from a full circle's 360° and divide the result by 8, you get 41.5° or about 42° as the apex angle for each of the eight isosceles-triangular sections of the roof.

Contrary to the written instructions ("It is possible, but not recommended, to fit the roof panel sections as individual pieces onto the roof..."), I cut eight little triangles from thin styrene to sit on the roof supports supplied. Each triangle is isosceles, with a 42° apex angle and two matching 69° base angles. I fastened these to the wood roof supports with Zap Canopy Glue Formula '560'.

Unsightly gaps between the plastic triangles were unavoidable, so I decided to top them with a piece of paper cut and folded to cover the roof. On a piece of ordinary printer paper, I used a compass to draw a circle considerably larger than the roof and then used a straightedge to draw a line from the circle's center to the circle. From this point on the circle, I

used a protractor to mark angles measuring 42°, 84°, 126°, and 168° clockwise from the line. Then, I repeated those measures counterclockwise from the line.

The next step is to use the same center point to draw a circle of the size needed for the roof and then to draw the eight chords which form the eaves of the roof. Use scissors or and X-acto knife to cut out and discard the ninth sector of your circle—it should measure 24°. Then, cut along the eight chords to remove your roof in one piece. Now, fold the paper down along the seven remaining radius lines. Finally, bring the edges of the missing 24° sector together and tape the underside to form a conical roof that should fit on the plastic triangles. I attached mine to them with Elmer's 'No Wrinkle' Rubber Cement.

You may finish your roof with acrylic craft paints, PanPastels, or Bragdon Enterprises weathering chalks. At this point the cannery is ready to receive shipments of tin to form cans, paper for labels, cardboard for shipping boxes, salt and sugar used in canning, occasional replacement machinery; and to ship cans of fruits and vegetables to hungry buyers across the continent.

# The Maintainer at Home, or The Revenge of the Electrons

Lest you think too highly of the Santa Cruz Northern, and its truly exemplary and skilled management, let's take a look at... the Maintainer at Home. Understand, the Maintainer himself eventually did just fine. But the messes he had to clean up after, well, those are a different story.

We start with a disaster of epic proportions. No really, hyperbole aside, it was. There is nothing worse for a host to have than the railroad melt down so badly that you have to call an op session to a halt. My op session in early December ended that way. The only blessing was that things crashed and burned late in the day so folks had a pretty good session all told.

(Murphy, on the other hand, was laughing his butt off in anticipation...)

If I drew a straight-line schematic of the western 2/3 of the upper level of the SCN you would see the station of Zayante (aka: Santa Cruz staging) on the left or west end, followed by Bridge 5A, the station and yard at Laurel, the siding at Sergeants and the station and yard at Fallon. This area is divided into 4 power districts, each with its own circuit protection. The SCN is equipped for the most part with the first-generation Tony's Train Exchange circuit breakers. They work; I've never had a reason to have to replace any of them.

So, the stage is set... About 4:00 in the afternoon, 7:00 PM railroad time, the crew on the Mountain Local, working at Fallon, yells for help. "We have a short we can't get rid of!" As I am walking over to Fallon, the crew working the Mill Job at Beroldingen Lumber, the major industry at Laurel says, "And there is no power at Laurel – we've stopped running." Hmmm. The crew of the Cementipede, whose power is at Sergeants, are happily bashing hoppers back and forth without a care in the world...

No power to the left of me, happy campers in the middle, a dead short to the right... all happening at the same time. Are the problems related? Is it one big problem? Not?

Fallon asked for help first. Yeah, dead short. Take locomotives off the track. Short. Take all rolling stock off the track. Short. Center all switches. Still shorted. Start visually checking all gaps in the track. No luck. Look under the layout at the three Tam Valley Depot frog juicers involved in controlling the switches and crossings at Fallon. All seem to have the correct LEDs lit.

Well maybe I can at least get Laurel back running and limp along to the end of the session. Nope. The circuit breaker has not popped. But there is no power to the rails even though there is power at the booster.

Ah, bad words my mother never taught me... like I said, at least things were going well, mostly, up until the end. Of course, there had been a report of power loss at Bridge 5A at one point during the session...

A week or so after New Year's Day I tackled the problems. Laurel seemed like the easiest. And it was simple to fix even if I have no idea how the problem occurred. With the NCE system turned on I confirmed

that the NCE booster was putting out track power. Tracing the bus wires I found no problems until I got to the circuit breaker.

Notice the spade connectors – they are almost 1/4" wide and more than that long. And one of the connectors had fallen off.

What was amazing (given the size of the components involved) was the circuit breaker was not only mounted in the fascia, but was in a space

so tight that it should have been impossible for either of the wires to have ROOM to fall off.

But one did.

The problem at Fallon was much more difficult to troubleshoot. Once isolated, the cause was extremely easy to understand (unfortunately for my ego). Also pretty easy to fix. But follow along:

The trackage at Fallon is complicated enough, with 16 switches, 2 crossings, and a scissors wye, that I use 3 frog juicers. It didn't seem likely, but I disconnected all three. It was unlikely.



So, I went in and started cutting the bus wire to isolate small sections of the power district; maybe 3-5 linear feet each with 4 or at most 5 switches. Cut wire – short. Cut wire again. Short. And again – ah. No short. With the problem area narrowed down I began a rail by rail, frog by frog examination both visually and with a volt meter. And finally found the problem.



When I installed the frog juicers at Fallon about two years ago I had to replace a throw bar on one switch. I cut a new one from a piece of PC board and nicely ran my MotoTool cutoff disc through the top of the new throw bar between the point rails to isolate the copper cladding. Except... I didn't. I somehow cut a nice slot on the wrong side of the PC board, leaving the copper cladding intact on what became the <u>underside</u> of the throw bar. I then very carefully soldered tabs to the point rails, drilled clearance holes in the tabs for 00-90 screws, drilled and tapped the throw bar to accept the screws and installed same.

For the better part of two years there were no problems because of this mistake. Somehow one of the screws was not contacting the copper cladding on the underside of the throwbar. Until it did. After 2 years. At the exact same time that a spade lug on a circuit breaker 20 feet away fell off.

(Murphy is, undoubtedly, hysterical!)

Of course, here I am crawling around under and over Mac St. Yard to make new connections to knit the bus wires for Fallon back together after fixing my mistake, and I just happen to notice that the power indicator LED on the wall wort that provides power to the only 5 switch machines on the SCN is flashing. Not steady. Like shorted. Uh-oh.

At least this problem I could trouble shoot without wire cutters! The leads from the wall wort go to a terminal strip. About 15 minutes of testing (loosen this terminal screw, remove that wire, plug the wall wort back in, unplug the wall wort, now go back and remove another wire...). I determined the problem was with one of the two switches controlled by LB tower at the east end of Mac St Yard.

I found that what looked like two identical toggle switches controlling the two switch machines were in fact not identical internally. One was three position ON-OFF-ON. The other was an ON-ON-ON switch and when left in the center position was shorting. This pair of switches have

been in use for maybe a decade or longer. And only NOW??

(Murphy is rolling on the ground...)

After some testing I was able to wire in a used replacement switch from the spare parts drawer and the wall wort was happy.

And so, as the sun began to set, the maintainer cursed as he stumbled when setting his motor car back on the track. He is headed west for Bridge 5A. His only solace? The thought of all the overtime pay he would be due next pay check.

A tale of woe for another day, I'm afraid.

### **Looking Back**

# By Mary C. Moore-Campagna, PCR Historian Voices – "Behind The Scenes" with Dave Connery, MMR



(After a long

and distinguished career as the PCR Historian, Dave has passed the reins on to yours truly. It seemed only fitting that after having interviewed so many other people, Dave himself should be the subject of this article so that everyone can know and admire his accomplishments. –MCMC)

From the very beginning, Dave was destined to be a railroad enthusiast. He grew up in a railroad family near the New York Central 4-track mainline between Albany and Schenectady, New York. His grandfather and an uncle by marriage both emigrated from Eng-

land and went to work as a blacksmith and blacksmith's helper, respectively, in the Rensselaer Shops of the New York Central (the end of the Boston & Albany subsidiary). He also had an uncle who was a clerk in the West Albany yards, an uncle who was a freight conductor and an uncle who was a Railway Mail Clerk on the run between Albany and Springfield. In addition, one cousin was an assistant trainmaster, another was a locomotive engineer and head shop steward, and still another eventually became Assistant Chief Engineer (Civil) for the Delaware and Hudson. Family holiday get-togethers were always interesting, as the men eventually started talking shop and dealing with issues they were involved in on the job.

When he was about 7 or 8 years old, Dave got a toy train set for Christmas. Unlike several of his friends who had 3-rail Lionel O-27 trains, Dave's were American Flyer 2-rail in S scale. Subsequent holidays provide him with added track and switches, but he soon learned there were certain rail arrangements that would not work (they shorted). At the time, he had neither the equipment nor knowledge to deal with these reversing loops; so he avoided those configurations. Instead, he focused on constructing several simple buildings; and he even built a simple mailbag "pickup and dropoff" system on the side of a boxcar. (While in retrospect it might seem somewhat rudimentary, it still provided plenty of play value.)

One of his early memories is of being taken, when he was a Cub Scout, to visit an adult O-scale train club in the upstairs of a building in the downtown area of Albany. When he saw the club layout, he was blown away by the complexity of the track work and the extensive amount of scenery work that had been done; and it is a place he says he has never forgotten.

Another time, he visited a downtown hobby shop for the first time and was completely captivated by the many shelves of amazing things that were available. He purchased a kit for a Santa Fe caboose (one of the few he could afford) and built it up, but he soon realized it would never work on his Flyer layout, as the kit was HO. Not to be deterred, he did enter it in the Arts and Crafts Fair sponsored by the PTA - and won first place in his category.

However, sports, work, cars and girls soon took precedence in his life over toy trains. As time went on, the trains were boxed up and stored in the damp East Coast cellar, never to see the light of day again.

After graduating from high school, Dave attended Union College in Schenectady and graduated with a BS in Psychology. After completing his undergraduate degree, he spent three years in the Air Force as a Personnel Officer. Following his time in the Air Force, Dave worked for five years as a District Scout Executive in the San Jose area while earning an MBA at San Jose State; and he then went to work for the local telephone company.

Nearly a dozen years later, Dave once again had the opportunity to work on Cub Scout projects – this time as an adult, working with his stepson. One month the group had "railroading" as their focus; and one rainy Friday night, Dave took a car full of Cub Scouts to visit the East Bay Model Railroad Engineers at their Emeryville location. It brought back memories of his own layout visit as a boy... and soon Dave was reliving his experiences by preparing a space in his attic to build a model railroad with his stepson.

However, this activity was not without peril: one Saturday morning, as he was wrestling a sheet of <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" plywood into place on the future floor, Dave met with an accident. His foot slipped off the joist and he fell, resulting in his straddling the joist with his leg sticking through the ceiling of the

kitchen, all the way up to the thigh. (He ruefully recalled that this event was not good for the kitchen ceiling, not good for the floor of the layout space and not at all good for the marriage.) However, he was undeterred and his first adult layout was a 5' X 9' tabletop layout from the Kalmbach book "An HO Model Railroad that Grows".

In December of 1980, Dave joined the NMRA and PCR, with a plan to attend the 1981 PCR Convention in Sacramento. This turned out to be a watershed event for Dave, opening up a plethora of ideas, suggestions for equipment and materials and a pathway to many lifelong friendships. (It is definitely worth mentioning – and commending – the fact that Dave has attended every PCR Convention since then.) Several changes in residences caused several starts and stops to a second, more expansive layout as Dave was exposed to new layout concepts (especially those of Jack Burgess.)

During the ensuing years, Dave acquired and read books on the Sierra Railway and the Virginia and Truckee. His immediate reaction was that here were two railroads which screamed to be modeled, particularly since at one time the Sierra suggested a possible second crossing of the Sierra Mountains and connection between these two short line railroads. That became his modeling goal: a two level layout with the V&T on the top and the Sierra on the lower level, connected by a helix. (As his skills and imagination progressed, he eventually added an HOn3 helix connecting the West Side Lumber on the lower level with the Carson & Colorado on the top.)


At this point, Dave and his supportive wife, Emma, purchased a home in San Ramon with a two-car garage. To hold the layout, Dave built a separate room in half of their garage. Bringing this concept to life allowed Dave years of modeling of equipment for the two railroads and numerous structures. The Narrow Gauge & Short Line Gazette, and in particular the excellent drawings by Gary Caviglia, provided inspiration and information.

One year at a PCR Convention in Sacramento Dave was chatting with the attendee next to him and they discovered they only lived about a mile apart. This led to Al Massi and Dave becoming good friends; and Al's ability to re-motor, regear and paint cranky old brass locomotives turned Dave's layout into a well-running and accurate model. In the early 1990's Brad Llovd, Denise Showalter, Rich Brennan, Rod Smith, Jim Long, Al and Dave started a Wednesday night

Round-Robin modeling group. Over the years Bill Baker, John Marshall, Jerry Littlefield, Chuck Mitchell, Darrell Dennis and Mike O'Dorney also became part of this group. Although various home moves, deaths and changes in modeling interests have changed the makeup of the group over the years, it still continues to flourish; and currently Pete Birdsong, Dan Rom, Wayne Floyd, Ray Davis, Brian Booth, Doug Smith, Steve Lane and Dave are active participants in the group.

In 1992, Dave became active as a docent at Railtown 1897 in Jamestown, California, mostly serving as a Car Host and Shops Tour guide. Dave was active there once or twice a week until 2019; however, he realized that after his 27 years of service, the lengthy driving distance had gradually become exhausting. As a result, after the COVID Pandemic shutdown ended and Railtown 1897 was once again open for business, he decided to retire from his service as a volunteer docent.

In 1998, Dave and Emma joined the Bay Area Garden Railway Society (BAGRS) and attended the National Garden Railway Convention. That was the start of a four-year project to rebuild the back yard and incorporate a garden railway. A key element of this plan was the inclusion of a waterfall (an 8-foot cascade) and several West Side features such as the Bourland Trestle (this turned out to be 19' long and 48" tall in Fn3 - 1:20.1 scale).

He built a second West Side trestle, West Side water tank and the Crumbine Oil tank, along with a number of generic structures; and the rail-road became known as the South West Side Lumber Co. Activity with BAGRS led to Dave becoming the initial Superintendent of the Tri-Valley

Division. In 2006, Dave & Emma served as Co-Chairs of the National Garden Railway Convention, which was held in Santa Clara and hosted nearly 2,000 garden railroaders from around the world. Once the onslaught of COVID had changed everything, Dave decided to remove the garden railway; and he donated the track and equipment to Railtown 1897 SHP early in the COVID shut down.

Throughout the years, Dave stayed active in Coast Division and PCR, holding many offices and positions and serving on numerous committees. In 1991 he became Coast Division Membership Chair under the direction of PCR Chair Tiny Carstens. He did this until early 1995, when he became Editor of the Branch Line, a position he held until 2000. He worked on a number of PCR convention committees, and in 2000 he was the Outside Activities Chair for the National NMRA Convention in San Jose. He also helped the 2011 Outside Activities Chair during the planning and preparation for the National Convention in Sacramento. Dave served four years as Coast Division Director; and during Gene Mayer's time as President, Dave also served four years as PCR Vice-President. In recent years, Dave has been PCR Historian, PCR Nominations Chair and acting PCR Honors Chair.

Nor were all of his activities limited to NMRA-related events: in 2004, Dave worked on the committee that conducted the National Narrow Gauge Convention. It was a great committee and put on a wonderful convention, one of the largest ever held. In late 2002, Dave realized that there would be no local portable layout at the convention; so he invited group of modelers - several on the Convention Committee - to his house, and they decided to build a portable layout for display at the convention (in the beginning, the group consisted of Scott Maze, Ken Lunders, Ron Kolodzieczak, Jim Long, Dave Biondi, Richard Brennan, Jim Eckman, Brad Lloyd and Dave). Ultimately, this became the Yosemite Short Line Railroad; and it was displayed at several Narrow Gauge Conventions, a PCR convention and many O-Scale West shows. Modeling in O-Scale turned out to be a lot of fun, resulting in a very enjoyable project with a great group of friends,

until the layout was retired in late 2024.

After dismantling the garden railway in the early Pandemic days, Dave also decided to dismantle his HO Sierra, Carson & Truckee Railroad. He first found homes for his structures and rolling stock, most of which went to several young modelers who were modeling the Sierra and the V&T. Then the room came down in July 2020, and once again the Connery family had a two-car garage. Dave then decided to try his hand in N scale by building a model of the



Southern Pacific type #18 depot based on the existing building in Danville. Soon Pete Birdsong suggested that he and Dave could model several of the towns along the San Ramon Branch. Before long, they had roped Wayne Floyd into helping with the bench work and they were building a section of the railroad. Then Brian Booth, Steve Lane and Paul Ingraham agreed to help out, and the San Ramon Valley Branch of the SP was being built in N-scale. This layout has been exhibited at two PCR Conventions, the Concord History Museum, The Museum of the San Ramon Valley in Danville and the Harrington Art Gallery in Pleasanton. (Additional help during these displays was provided by Lisa Gorrell, Doug Smith and Ray Davis.)

Dave's service to the hobby and to PCR/NMRA has not gone unrecognized. In 1995, Dave was chosen as Coast Division Member of the Year; in 2000, he received the PCR President's Award (Regional Member of the Year); and in 2003, he received the coveted John Allen Memorial Award. Dave also joined a select group when he met all the qualifications and became an NMRA Master Model Railroader in 2015.

He is an excellent example of a friend, mentor, teacher, advisor, and willing participant in multiple railroad-related activities, and the PCR is very fortunate that he ended up in our neck of the woods.

# **Not Just "Playing With Trains"**

I have two friends with whom I meet for lunch monthly. Our common interest is music. One is a superb pianist, and the other is a fine baritone. (I'm a tenor.) Those aren't their "day gigs." One is in real estate and the other is a retired US Corps of Engineers general.

They understand art in its many forms. The general is also a fine landscape artist. So as part of our lunch last month I took them to the two railroads that I work on: My Nicasio Northern, and Paul Weiss' Central Vermont.

Paul gave them the tour of the CV. A comment he made about operating the railroad being an "immersive simulation game" inspired this note. He is absolutely right and it is a great way to state it. Our operating sessions bringing the railroad to life present a collaborative, role-playing challenge to be worked out by our participants. It's a puzzle in four dimensions.

Moving trains and placing cars properly with one eye on the clock is fun. Each town is a puzzle. How does one place a car at its designated industry with the fewest number of moves? Which cars in town need to be lifted, re-spotted, or replaced in their original position after cars around them have been moved?

How does the work in a town happen without affecting other trains, shown either in the timetable or for which the participant has orders? The fourth dimension, time, is a big factor in this game.

Playing with trains? Yes, but it's not that simple.

While we were at the CV I pointed out Jim Providenza's model of the Yantic Product Mill in Norwich, Conn. My friend the general was taken with it, and Jim showed him pictures of the original and the architectural drawings that Dave Clemens had done of the structure for Jim. If you haven't seen the model, suffice it to say it has lots of roof angles and a variety of building styles that the prototype grew into. Jim's model is a work of art.






### **Welcome New Coast Officers**



### Joan Fleck - Gas Station

"I don't remember the kit manufacturer but I picked up at an estate sale (all model railroad stuff). It only included the 1930 ish main building so I added everything else, built the wooden fence around it and gave it a metal roof. It was a project I worked on during the 2020 covid isolation."







### **Cliff Baumer - Water Tank**

"The Branchline Water Tank was a challenging kit. Keeping the bents, sides and frost box all in square was paramount. There are four bents, all have to be equally spaced, making sure there was room for the frost box. The tank was made up of four sides, each made up of 8 horizontal boards and either 7 or 3 vertical posts. The vertical posts must be square and equally spaced with the opposite side posts. Missing were instructions to drill holes from post to post for positioning the rods in the corresponding vertical posts. This should be done prior to gluing the horizontal boards on the posts."







### **Giuseppe Aymar - Fractioning Column**

"For this model Roundhouse Quaker oil tank cars' center portions were glued end to end (without the round ends), elephant style.

To maintain trueness for a straight line I glued tabs inside each tank thus allowing the next tank to slide over the tabs and be in exact alignment. The completed column measures 240 scale feet requiring 3 sixty footer flat cars and 2 forty footers end cars to cover the overhangs. The column pivots on brackets welded to the flat cars' deck and secured by a pin so it can navigate curves with a minimum 38 degree radius. All details scratch built. Painted with red primer."





### Giuseppe Aymar - DOD (Dept of Defense) Heavy Load

"This load is likely part of a reactor or a rocket. It rides on a 12heavy duty axles flat bed.

Entirely scratch built in styrene excluding the trucks. Looks simple at first glance but complex in having to keep entire platform flat and true. The end platforms are attached to the end trucks at a lower level than the main platform. The tarps are "dental dams" and are secured via surgical sutures as the needle is thin and cuts through the latex tarps without ripping them as there is no knot on the interface between the needle and the suture itself."

### Dave Croshere - Gear Frame to Baker Valves

"Dave brought in a gear frame to the Baker valves located on a brass 0-4-0 locomotive he is redoing. The problem with brass locos is soldering small pieces and not unsoldering everything close to it. I managed to do it with multiple heat sinks around the Gear Frame. It worked so well I wanted to share it after I painted it.

I found a good YouTube video on how baker valves gears work. With Baker valve gear I never understood what the levers were doing."
