Like so many of us in the hobby my interest in trains started with a Lionel set under the Christmas tree around 1953. When we moved from Chicago to the western suburbs my father set up the train set on a permanent table in a corner of our basement. That corner became mine until college and military service. I was around ten years old when we were visiting some friends of my parents. They

had two sons who had an 8' \times 8' HO layout with buildings and some scenery. That hooked me on HO and eventually the 4' \times 8' Lionel layout was replaced with a 5-1/2' \times 9' HO layout. After college, six years in the Navy (Vietnam era), meeting my wife in the Bay Area and the early years of marriage and kids, I picked up the hobby again, becoming an NMRA life member in 1989.

As we all know, living in California means no basement. That meant that I had to be creative when it came to building a layout. Over the next 35 or so years I built small transportable and modular layouts in HO, N, On3 and O27. During that period, back in 2012, I became a member of the California State Railroad Museum and a couple years ago I joined the team that maintains the NMRA display at the museum. So, I decided to throw my hat in the ring for one of the new Member Representative positions. My intent is to get to know my fellow members, hopefully making some lasting friendships, and to give back to the organization and hobby.

Ed Merrin described the research and building of his model of the Shamrock Cement Plant located in Petaluma and being modeled on his layout.





We were very fortunate to have three well known Bay Area model railroaders, Tony Thompson, Clif Linton, and Jim Radkey, attend the meeting and talk about their modeling experiences and their layouts.

Tony Thompson

The layout represents an imaginary branch line, leaving Southern Pacific's Coast Line in the Central Coast area n San Luis Obispo and Santa Maria, at a junction named Shumala. The branch is imagined to serve the agricultural production of the area north of Santa Maria, largely row-crop vegetables, with some tree fruit.

Mainline trains, whether through freights or passenger, simply pass by on the main. The only interchange with the branch is by



means of local freights. On this part of the Coast Line (the Guadalupe Subdivision), there were two. One was a turn, called the Surf Turn, which operated roughly halfway from San Luis Obispo toward the next division point, Santa Barbara, to the south (railroad east) and then returned. The turning point was the station called Surf (well south of Guadalupe). But there was extensive traffic closer to San Luis, often too much for the Surf Turn, so the other local

operated to handle that traffic. It was called the Guadalupe Local, for the town at which it turned back to San Luis.

On the layout, a switch crew at the mainline junction, Shumala, switches both inbound and outbound cars there, and the branch train crew switches the towns of Ballard and Santa Rosalia. The branch is shown in Figure 1, in a map adopted from SP's division map. The timetable provided at the session includes a schematic map of each town on the branch, showing track names and industry locations.

The largest amount of switching on the layout is at Ballard, the track arrangement for which is modified from Terry Walsh's

"West Agony & Inchoate" layout, published in *Model Railroader* in July 1960. The other two towns have simpler track arrangements.




Figure 2. Arrangement of the SP mainline on my layout. Most of it, concealed; it is only visible where it passes the town of Shumala, between the two "tunnel" symbols.

The main line staging is accomplished in a "transfer table" arrangement underneath Ballard, where 12 staging tracks permit ample train selection. Because it is important to understand how the SP main line is arranged on this lay- out, I have shown it in somewhat simplified form below, as Figure 2.

Operating sessions rely on a layout clock, which operates 1:1. The SP timetable is in force, and crews working at Shumala must ensure the main line is clear for passing trains. My interest in prototypical waybills for model use has resulted in the following system. Crews obtain local waybills and agent messages when they begin work at Shumala or at Ballard. The crew at Ballard collects additional bills from the agent at Santa Rosalia when they arrive there to switch. Ordinarily crews also receive a message of some sort from each local agent, giving them information they need about cars not fully described in the waybills, for example, icing requirements.

There are no pockets for waybills on the fascia; completed waybills are returned to the agent or the depot bill box when leaving town, while outgoing bills travel with the branch crew back to Shumala.


Clif Linton







For 2024, the PCR is presenting an on-line virtual version of the convention for those members that cannot attend in person.

While it is never possible to replicate the in-person experience of a live convention, the PCR 2024 Virtual Convention will provide a part of the experience for remote attendees. But, if you cannot attend the in-person convention, you can get a great on-line experience with both clinics and other on-line activities. Registration for the PCR 2024 Virtual Convention costs \$20 before January 15, 2024 and \$30 after that date.

On-Line Virtual Experiences Currently Planned

- Clinics one of the three clinics rooms will be equipped with cameras and microphones to
