
Giuseppe Aymar - Snyder Corporation Fueling Station

Refueling stations for diesel locomotives have changed in the last few decades. Class 1 Railroads now expect fast, clean service with an eye to preserving the environment. The Snyder Corporation has put together a "do it all" in one-stop operation. Fuel, sand, oil, grease, and water can now be delivered to as many locomotives as the Railroad desires. All the equipment is color-coded for ease of service.




My model will accommodate five units per track. It is a rendition of the basic Snyder design, plus I added the sand bins. The cement

platforms are from a Walthers kit, as well as the sand bins, fuel pumps, and the colorful boxes with pivoting arms, while the overhead platform, railings, stairs, various pipes, and electrical cabinets were scratchbuilt.







When Walthers announced a new run of Southern Pacific SD9s, I got excited as 1; they are the one big hole in my SP roster, and 2, SD9s were prevalent on the NWP from the beginning of the diesel era. With this in mind, I ordered 4 of the same number and changed them to numbers of my choosing to avoid conflicts.

Model Railroading can be satisfying particularly if you have done the research as to the time period and accurately producing the plans and finally arriving at the finished product. For me, I have a need to add something extra for those who have a sharp eye for spotting that just isn't right.




Don Obermeyer - Quick Mockup Structures

There is a need for mockups on a large layout. I needed something quick and easy to build that I could move around as track plans were fine tuned. I settled on gluing up mockups using elevation drawings from website, kit plans, and magazines.

First I searched records to determine what was where in the 1940's, which is the era I model. Sanborn Insurance maps are a great resource and many cities are on line (Library of Congress) and available. The bonus for me is that



most of them date from the mid-20's and 30's. You can scale them to your modeling scale.





For structures I scanned plans from old MR, RMC, and Mainline Modeler. Also scanned in plan drawings from kit instructions and historical association publications. The internet is also a good resource for drawings.



I use MS Word as it has rulers for controlling margins that make it easier to scale the inserted picture to your scale. I print these out on regular paper, cut out the paper elevations, spray glue them to lightweight cardboard or chip board, and cut them out using a fresh new Exacto blade. I do bevel the corners at 45 degree so they fit together better, especially if the cardboard has too much thickness.

The pieces are scotch taped together. As these are just mockups, I don't reinforce the corners with wood strips but one could for more durable stand ins until the final model is built. You can color the mockup using markers if desired. Best to color them before you assemble the structure.



Many of the structures on my layout are from standard plans from the prototype railroads, such as depots, coal towers, section houses, and other company buildings, that are available on the historical association websites. So I can build one mock-up and use it multiple times in fine tuning locations at each town. This has been very helpful for depots.





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

Also many generic buildings can be used as stand ins. There are a lot of grain elevators in the region I model, so I can use a couple of them to mock-up at town.

This approach has saved me time and money in laying out my layout. Some of the structures will continue as stand ins until I get around to building the final model.



As I get to the larger cities on the layout, I'm going to try using photos to mock up buildings. YouTube has several videos on using Google Earth to find and save photos from the street view. Those videos also show how to correct the perspective so you can use them for building flats. That's my next challenge.

Scott Lockhart - On30 Narrow Gauge Articulated Camelback

I have always found Camelback locomotives to be interesting because of their oversize fireboxes, cabs in the center of the locomotives, and that they were doing recycling before recycling was a fact of life (using waste material from anthracite mining). My first model was a kitbash of a Bachmann On30 2-6-0 locomotive modified to a Camelback using a kit from Backwoods Miniatures. I started my second model loosely based on an Erie Railroad articulated Camelback. With no kits available I used styrene material to fashion the firebox, fireman's shelter roof, running boards, and tender coal



bin. Maybe 3D printing for my next project. A Tsunami2 decoder with a keep-alive, a Boiler Barker speaker, and LED lighting completed the project. Weathering was done with a combination of rattle can, brush, and airbrush painting with weathering chalks. I also realized that I did not take photos of the model during the meeting.

Jason presented some weathered locomotives and rolling stock that used a variety of techniques, including dry brushing, acrylic washes, air brushing, and weathering powder. I also presented some small dioramas made from scrap wood that I have used to practice various scenery techniques

In February Rich acquired what is remaining of this layout, and is in the process of restoring it to operational condition. Rich gave a brief overview of the layout, its history, and how he came to be the current custodian. 

I began my railroad career volunteering on the family owned Passumpsic Railroad in Vermont. I ran my first steam locomotive there before I even had a drivers license! I also volunteered at the nearby White Mountain Central Railroad also on the steam locomotives there. My first paid railroad job was on the Green Mountain Railroad working the tourist trains and cleaning the locomotives. I ran away with the Ringling Ros. And Barnum & Bailey circus after high school and started as a train mechanic on the Red Unit before being promoted to Assistant Trainmaster of the Blue Unit the next year. After traveling for two years on the eastern half of the country and into



Mexico I came west to California and took a job running the shop on the **Napa Valley Wine Train** for a short time. I then spent a few years as a mechanic and conductor on the **California Western Railroad** before settling in Santa Rosa and working as an engineer and conductor for the **Richmond Pacific Railroad** where I still am. All of these stories can be read in more detail in a small book I did called **A Railroaders Journey**. If you get in touch with me I can order you one and get it to you. 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

Paul spoke about the Central Vermont layout in Novato after the group passed the milestone of 7 years of construction... and asked himself the question, what are the 10 things that visitors seemed to stop and notice and furthermore comment on? Perhaps other layout owners can benefit from some of these findings. Paul also discussed 3D printing from two perspectives. First that he believes that every layout owner has had a need for some 3D printing at some point whether they realized it or not. Second that you can attempt simple 3D print design for free and with no experience at all to get started... sending the results out to a printing company such that you only need a computer. Our member Jason Schoenmann, your elected Member Representative, even offered to tutor and support anybody who wants to try. Paul used 3D printing in several ways as part of the Central Vermont project, particularly in the making of attractive place name plaques.


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Presentation - Building a Vertical Staging Yard

Dave Croshere

Vertical Staging, Design and Build

This presentation was a good opportunity to show off a project I did almost seven years ago. It is still very reliable and operators can use it mostly without a problem. It is also an unusual feature to see when you walk into my train room.





Construction

Two angle irons are bolted to the studs. Absolutely plumb. Getting an idea of the concept. The board can only go up or down, not in or out and not twisting off 90 degrees. V grove roller bearing ride on the rails is the perfect solution. In the middle is my old screw garage door lifting in a track.




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Presentation - Building a Vertical Staging Yard

This picture shows how the track comes in from the other room and works into the vertical staging. I was lucky the track was 48" off the floor. That allows me 34" up and down, that works out to eight shelf staging tracks. A switch has to be made to go into the staging.





This picture shows the final board in place. The shelves are attached. Each shelf has a dot 12" from the left. That is a hinge that allows the twelve inches to droop a 1/4" at the left end.

That is the secret to why my design works. You can see the counterweights on each side behind the board. I figure the board and eight consists would weigh about sixty pounds. The elevation buttons are in place like an elevator. A new garage door motor is in place, A universal joint connects it to the old screw track now vertical. The screw track has some overkill bearings at each end. The small disc below the bottom track to the right of the screw is the potentiometer. The potentiometer keeps accurate track of where the board is up and down.



The fourth pic is back to why my system works. You can see the rails aren't even (red circle). When a lever is brought across a ramp lifts the shelf end to the correct height. When it is at the correct height the rail joiners come across an engage the rails on the shelf. When the rail joiners are secure they power the shelf so the loco can cross. This is all done with one ball lever.


